

Old Cell Phones

From the Bellingham Police "Block Watch" newsletter

There are a lot of reasons why people don't carry a cell phone. If you have someone close to you who does not have a cell phone, but you want them to be able to call 911 when an emergency arises, consider giving them one of your old cell phones.

The Federal Communications Commission requires all cell phone service providers, like Sprint, AT&T and Verizon, to accept 911 calls from any wireless phone – even one that no longer has a phone number or service contract.

This may not work for all older phones. Some older phones operate only with analog networks, and would not be picked up by a digital-only service like Sprint. But for the most part this may be an inexpensive solution for peace of mind, and worth checking to see if that old cell phone can be recycled to a new purpose.

City Offers Water Conservation Rebates

City water customers participating in the Community Energy Challenge can qualify for a rebate up to \$150 from the Water Conservation Program. The rebate applies to the purchase and installation of certain water conserving fixtures, drip irrigation, or rainwater catchment systems.

The Community Energy Challenge strives to make energy efficiency as easy as possible from start to finish. The energy assessment includes customized recommendations and assistance with funding and contractors.

The City Water Conservation Program aims to reduce overall customer water demand through encouraging both fixture upgrades and behavioral changes.

"Pairing these two programs recognizes the important link between energy and water use," said Anitra Accetturo, Water Conservation Specialist. "Conserving water conserves energy, and conserving energy conserves water," said Accetturo. Homeowners benefit by reducing utility bills, while the city reduces the cost of supplying drinking water.

Bellingham Library – Whatcom READS!

Read Jim Lynch's latest novel Border Songs and participate in at least one Whatcom READS! event. Border Songs is set locally, so it's the perfect book to share with your friends and neighbors. Lynch will visit Whatcom County February 22 to 24!

Part of the fun of Whatcom READS! is getting the chance to explore issues related to the book in-depth, and discuss the issues with others who have also read the book.

Book club members (or individuals) will have two opportunities to discuss Border Songs with author Jim Lynch himself: from 2:30 to 4:00 p.m. at the Bellingham Public Library on February 22, and from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. on February 24 at the Lynden Library.

Lynch will speak at two free public presentations on Thursday, February 24 at Whatcom Community College's Syre Center. At 1:30 p.m., Lynch will give a keynote address. At 7:30 p.m., Lynch will be interviewed by Bob Winters, WCC Division Chair for Arts and Humanities. Each author event will have its own unique spin and avid fans are encouraged to attend some or all of them.

Bird watchers won't want to miss presentations by **Joe Meche of the North Cascades Audubon Society.** Meche served as the "birding consultant" to the author (the main character is an avid birdwatcher). He'll lead a **birding tour of Whatcom Creek on Sunday, February 20; meet at the Central Library at 1:00 p.m. At 6:30 p.m. that evening, he'll**

reconvene at the Central Library Lecture Room at 6:30 p.m. for a slide show of the various avian species mentioned in the book.

There's still time to read Border Songs before Lynch's local appearances. Bellingham Public Library has copies in book, audiobook, playaway and e-book formats.

Open House - Wastewater Plant Improvements

The City of Bellingham will host an open house featuring preliminary designs for planned **Post Point Wastewater Treatment Plant** improvements, scheduled **6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24, 2011 at Fairhaven Middle School Commons Area,** 110 Parkridge Road.

In an informal, open house atmosphere, project staff will provide displays and responses to key concerns raised through a series of public meetings in 2009 and 2010. Participants will have an opportunity to talk with both staff and consultants and view scale and computer interactive models of proposed improvements. People are invited to attend throughout the open house hours. Additional public information meetings will be planned throughout the project.

The proposed improvements are at the 30% design phase, based on the preferred improvement alternative approved by the Bellingham City Council in March 2010.

In December 2010, the City selected Mortenson Construction to join the planning team as a General Contractor/Construction Manager. Mortenson was selected through a process that involved qualification-based review along with a bid. Seven firms submitted for the project, four were interviewed and the top two invited to bid on the project. Mortenson will work with City staff and Carollo Engineering to develop the detailed design of the Post Point Improvements project before starting construction in 2012.

The City is planning necessary expansion of the Post Point Wastewater Treatment Plant because the wastewater treatment plant is projected to approach its rated capacity by 2014.
