

City's Online Survey – Open Until 5pm Tuesday, November 1st

These questions are key to an ambitious downtown planning effort designed to identify actions our community can take to support a vibrant, thriving downtown.

A community outreach effort dubbed "myDowntown" was launched, inviting people from Bellingham to share their experiences of and ideas for downtown Bellingham.

An <u>online survey</u>, activities and prizes at the Bellingham Farmers Market and <u>social</u> <u>media conversations</u> are just a few of the ways people are invited to weigh in on the City's <u>Downtown Plan</u>, a two-year planning effort led by the City of Bellingham and supported by various community partners.

Outreach is the first phase – Information gathered this fall about what is and is not working well downtown will feed into the next phase of the Downtown Plan process, when Bellingham residents, business owners and others will be invited in early 2012 to come together in a variety of ways to absorb feedback offered by the community, share more ideas and create solutions.

By mid-2012, City officials expect to be formulating a draft Downtown Plan for review by community members, stakeholder groups and City advisory committees. A final plan is expected to be presented to the Bellingham Planning Commission and Bellingham City Council for consideration during the first half of 2013.

Why downtown planning matters – The Downtown Plan, when completed in 2013, will be a blueprint for success to support business investment, building renovations, and new commercial and residential development. The plan will create an ambitious framework for future investments, amenities and improvements to be made by the City and others.

"See and Be Seen" Campaign Promotes Safe Night Bicycling

Local agencies, businesses, and bicycle safety advocates are running a community education campaign to increase the use of bike lights and promote safe night riding. The "See and Be Seen" campaign combines **education**, **enforcement and access to lights to encourage cyclists to use bike lights** and be more visible when riding at night.

"Working in the Emergency Room I see bicyclists coming in with injuries that could be prevented. I encourage all cyclists to be more visible by riding with working front and back lights, wearing bright clothing, and obeying the rules of the road. When you are visible to motorists and ride responsibly, you are much less likely to end up being a statistic," said Todd Guiton, Northwest Emergency Physicians, physician assistant.

Along with community education, increasing access to bike lights is a key component of the campaign. Local bike shops are generously offering a **10% discount coupon on bike lights through November 30th**. Fairhaven Bike and Ski, Jack's Bicycle Center, Kulshan Cycles, Fantatik Bike Company, The HUB Community Bike Shop, the Drop 'N' Zone, and Earl's Bicycle Shop all support the campaign.

Throughout the campaign, Bellingham and WWU Police will increase their enforcement of bike light violations, giving warnings and/or tickets to cyclists riding after dark without lights.

Washington State law requires that during the hours of darkness cyclists must use a **white front** light attached to the bike visible for 500 feet, along with a red reflector attached to the back of the bike. Lights attached to helmets, clothing or backpacks are only legal when used in addition to lights mounted on the bicycle.

Community partners for the "See & Be Seen" campaign include Bellingham Police and Public Works Departments, everybodyBIKE, WWU Sustainable Transportation, WWU Police Department, Kona USA, Mt. Baker Bicycle Club, Whatcom Traffic Safety Task Force, and Cascade Radio Group.

Invasive Asian clams found in Lake Whatcom

Local and state officials recently confirmed the presence of invasive Asian clams in Lake Whatcom, and are working to determine the extent of the infestation and how best to respond. Area residents are asked to assist by being aware of the infestation and reporting any clams they see in the lake.

This species, first reported by a Lake Whatcom resident, can impact water quality, compromise the use of recreational areas, and impede flows through water intake pipes.

City staff were to provide an update to the Bellingham City Council during its regular meeting Monday, Oct. 10, 2011; check the <u>Council agenda</u> for details.

The Asian clam, first discovered in the Columbia River in 1938, is now present in 38 states. The clams are capable of reaching densities in the thousands per square meter, competing with native mussels for food and space.

Samish Crest Trail Update

Project: upgrade from informal footpath to trail From Jonathan Schilk, Parks & Recreation Department:

- In 90% design phase
- Start trail at existing footpath/Racine Street intersection (south of Consolidation), run path south along existing footpath for approximately 2900 feet. Maximum trail grade will be 10% (most of the trail will be less than 8.3%)
- Trail width 4' with 1' shoulders, crushed limestone surfacing.
- I am currently working on permit documents and hope to submit permit documents in November.
- Put project out to bid in January or February 2012. Based on my site observations I think construction will begin when soil becomes workable (I estimate this to be no earlier than June or July).
- Eventually we will extend the trail farther south into properties that have been recently purchased by Parks and Recreation.
